The virtue of patience is not easily observed in our fast-paced culture. Everything seems to be pressing and rushed. Maybe it's the time of year. Christmas music began playing on some radio stations immediately after Halloween. But it seems more than just the season. ## Hope tor the Tubire Campaign


